The team at GMFTS is deeply saddened by the loss of David Stackpole, our founding Board Chair. He was instrumental in the growth and development of our budding nonprofit in the early days. Katherine Sims, our organization's founder and former Executive Director recalls David's influence:



"I remember meeting David for the first time at the Lowell Graded School Harvest Festival. He drove up in his little black VW GTI, grinning and looking very dapper. He immediately started chatting with everyone in that calm, eager, and present "Stackpole" way. At the time, I had no idea how important David would become to me as a mentor & friend, but I did know right away that he was a special person and someone that I needed to get to know. After that initial meeting, he worked with me to grow our little garden program into a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization. In fact, he was the one who came up with the name Green Mountain Farm-to-School!"

We are grateful for David's 12+ years of service to our organization, his vision of a just and equitable local food system, and for his guidance and passion as we were just getting our feet under us.

COVID-19 Relief in the Northeast Kingdom

CREATING NEW PARTNERSHIPS IN THE CHARITABLE FOOD SYSTEM

GMFTS immediately shifted the operations of our local food hub, Green Mountain Farm Direct, to address rising food insecurity with healthy, local food. Since March, we have distributed **\$225,000 worth of free local food** to those in need. All of this money is going to local farmers and contributing to the region's economic recovery.

→ FARMERS FEEDING FAMILIES:

This summer, GMFTS coordinated the distribution of **5,200 boxes** of fresh local produce and over **500 boxes** of mixed dairy products to food shelves through the Farmers Feeding Families Food Box Program (FFF).

→ FOOD SHELF DONATIONS:

Thanks to new emergency funding sources, GMFTS was able to donate a cumulative **\$36,000 worth of local food** to area food shelves.

→ VERMONT EVERYONE EATS:

GMFTS is managing a Vermont Everyone Eats (VEE) hub in the NEK through the end of 2020. VEE will reimburse restaurants that have been negatively impacted to prepare **6,440 locally-sourced meals** for those struggling with food insecurity.

Shifting and Expanding Local Programs

STAYING CONNECTED & ADJUSTING TO THE NEW NORMAL

GMFTS has adapted it's regular programs to **continue serving** our constituents throughout the pandemic.

→ THE LUNCHBOX & MARKET BASKET

The Lunchbox served **4,210** free “grab and go” meals to children 18 and under during the summer of 2020! The “Market Basket” also returned to distribute **474 lbs. of free produce** harvested from school & community gardens.

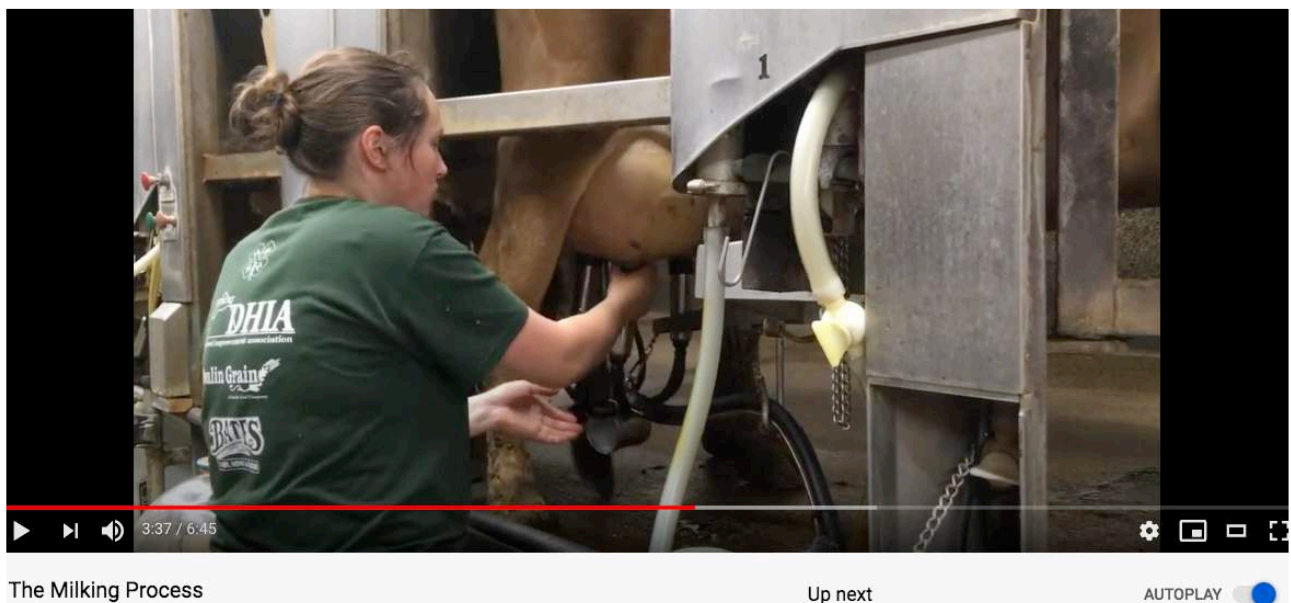

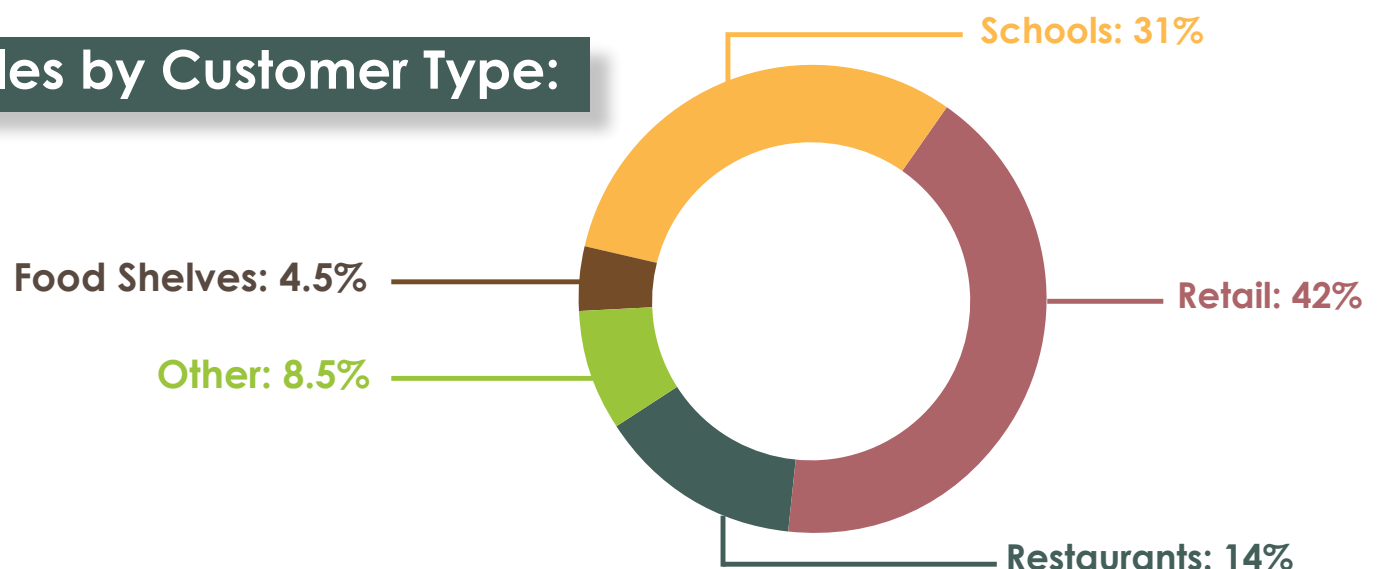
CELEBRATING OUR BEST YEAR YET!

Green Mountain Farm Direct (GMFD) is a regional food hub increasing access to healthy, local food by delivering food from local farms to schools, restaurants, grocery stores, and other groups and institutions in Northern Vermont.

2019 - 2020 Highlights:

- Our staff has grown! In the summer of 2019 we added a Logistics Manager, bringing **increased capacity** to allow for better service.
- GMFD saw its best year yet with **\$418,855** in total sales during the 2019-2020 program year. This represents a **9.6% growth** over last year and the highest sale numbers since the program's founding in 2009!
- Products were distributed from **42** different local producers to **104** different customer accounts.
- GMFD brought on **5 new rural buying clubs** that allow community members to "buy-in" on a portion of a Farm Direct delivery. This helps **immunocompromised populations avoid virus exposure** in far-away grocery stores.

GMFD and CAE Farm Connex: Working Together to Expand Services

Farm Direct has been able to **expand its service area** to **reach more customers in accross the state** thanks in part to a new partnership with the Center for an Angricultural Economy (CAE) that acquired our distribution partner, Farm Connex, in late 2019. This new partnership and our involvement in the VT Food Hub Collaborative has allowed us to add new producers and expand our product line, **improving access accross the food system.**

GROWING PARTNERSHIPS AND IMPACT

Our Farm-to-School (FTS) program partners with schools throughout the Northeast Kingdom to increase the amount of healthy, local foods in the cafeteria and provide experiential learning opportunities through school gardens, on-farm field trips, and nutrition and agriculture lessons.

2019-2020 In-School Highlights:



While school was in session, we reached **2,370** students at **21** NEK schools with our programming. Coordinators delivered **286** educational workshops, **71** taste tests, led **4** farm field trips, and facilitated **13** Farm to School committee meetings.



18 School gardens produced more than **2,000** pounds of food, valued at approximately **\$4,000**, all donated to cafeterias, food shelves, and the Lunchbox food truck.



Our FTS Program Manager provided training and technical assistance to educators in **4 new schools** in the Kingdom, and partnered with **7** VT organizations to develop an **online professional development series** open to all educators in the state.

The Lunchbox Food Truck

SERVING MORE FREE MEALS THAN EVER BEFORE!

The Lunchbox is a summer meal site and mobile learning kitchen keeping Northeast Kingdom kids and communities healthy by providing free summer meals to all children 18 and under, offering affordable meals to adults for purchase, and facilitating nutrition education and food literacy all in a stigma-free environment.

Summer of 2019 Highlights:

- The Summer of 2019 was our best year yet as we served **3,251 free kids meals** and **566** healthy adult meals!
- A focus on local food procurement supported **7 local farms** throughout the summer.
- We piloted the **Market Basket** - a new initiative to distribute free school garden produce as well as gleaned & donated crops to families visiting the Lunchbox.

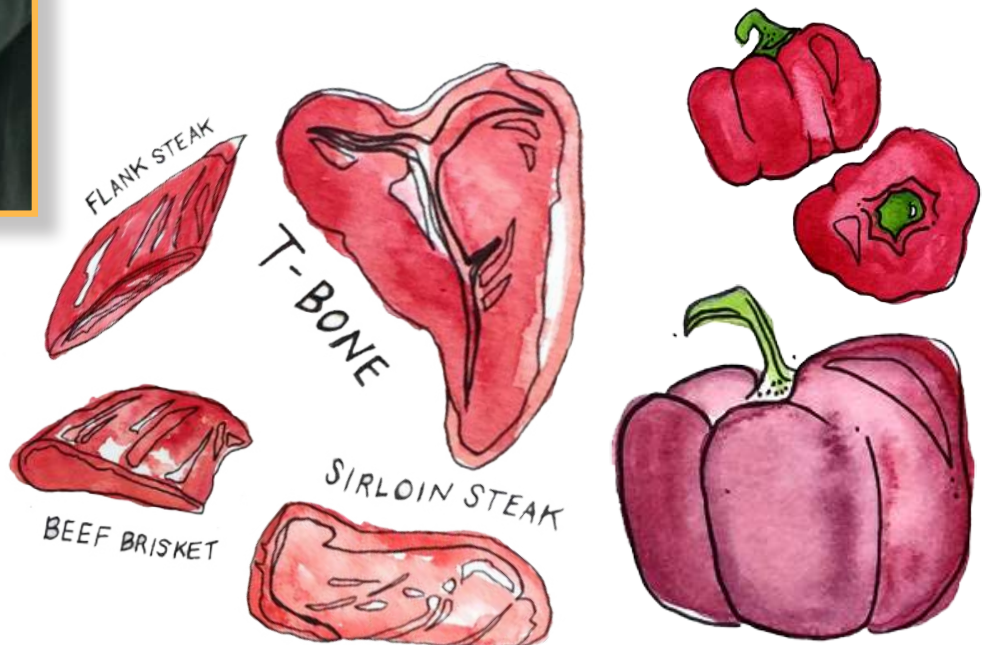


2019-2020 Highlights:

- Harvest of the Month brought on 3 new crops to the 2019-2020 calendar - **Beef, Whole Grains, and Sweet Peppers.**
- Vermont Harvest of the Month has now been replicated in at least **20 states** accross the Country!
- More than **180 schools** around the state annually “take the pledge” to use Vermont Harvest of the Month resources in their school.

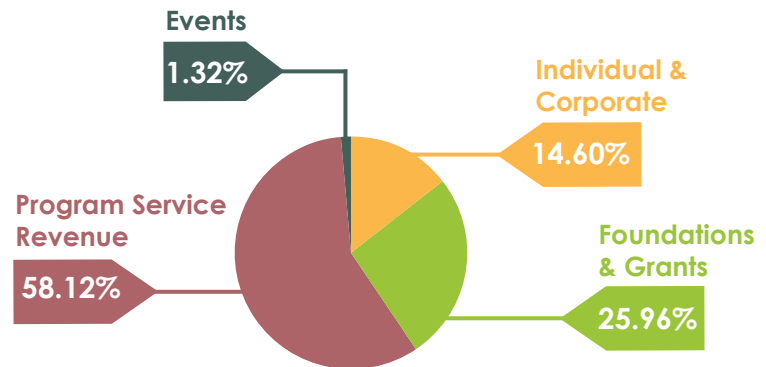

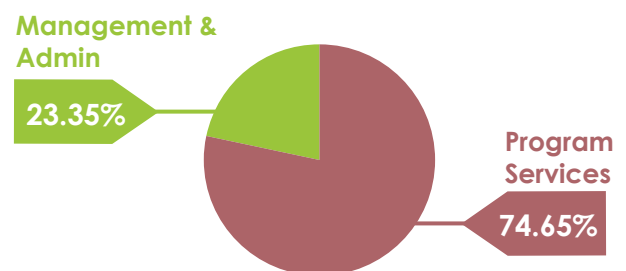
